A letter from our ED

Dear friends,

We are delighted to share with you the accomplishments of Spring Communities for the year 2023. This year has been marked by remarkable progress in our mission to enhance the social and economic status of marginalized communities by bolstering livelihoods for a more resilient community. However, it has also been characterized by significant challenges.

Furthermore, our major achievements have also been significant in expanding our areas of operation and in establishing contracts with new partners.

As we embark on 2024, we are resolute and committed to continuing this momentum with a five-year plan (2024-2028) centered around five key objectives, with marginalized communities remaining our primary beneficiaries:

- Promoting access to quality education for marginalized communities
- Facilitating access to good health and improved well-being
- Generating employment opportunities and enhancing the capacities of youth and women

Strengthening communication and visibility for advocacy towards marginalized communities
 Enhancing partnerships and collaboration with stakeholders for greater impact

We have implemented tailored interventions for children and youth, both within and beyond formal schooling, addressing the myriad obstacles they face in accessing education.

1. Ensuring Access to Education

650 children and youth, including 400 primary school children and 250 secondary school students from the Ntahangwa and Mukaza communes, as well as school clubs in the Nanje Nobaho center, received school kits, ensuring their access to education.



2. Strengthening the Quality of Education and Learning Environment.

- Creation of a curriculum: a

multi-disciplinary learning tool (comic strip) has been developed by spring communities and validated by the Ministry of National Education to help reduce the school dropout rate and promote child rights. The comic strip will be used in 6 pilot schools from April 2024, with the aim of rolling it out to other schools in the country.

- **Hubs d'Inspiration (HI)**: is an approach that has promoted the creation of 12 learning spaces in schools to strengthen extra-curricular activities. 6 schools supported have increased awareness, participation, protection and skills



- **Early Childhood Education**: **43** children **-** aged 3 to 11 demonstrating confidence, wellbeing in school and at home through the digital platform AMA la Giraffe.





The year 2023 witnessed improvements in the economic status of youth and women through job creation and the development of transferable skills that enhance their livelihoods.

1. Job Creation

Value-adding Recycling: **25** jobs were created through the recycling of plastic waste, including 790 plastic bottles, 36 (5-liter) buckets, and 9 meters of PVC pipes recycled.

412 recycled products were sold, generating an annual income of \$2,038.75 USD. As a result of the increased annual income, the standard of living of the beneficiaries at the innovation hub improved, as did the quality of our products.

As part of its research, the innovation hub has developed a process for creating locally made pens from recycled plastics. Production is starting soon.



2. Vocational Center

We recognise that every child and youth has their own aspirations, so we developed approaches that provide young people with transferable skills to improve their livelihoods.

- **Confluence Art**: Three art groups involving **75** young people (50 boys + 25 girls) acquired skills in artistic creativity and innovation, earning 5,000,000 Fbu in revenue through art competitions.
- **ICT** (Information and Communication Technology): **150** youths (95 boys + 55 girls) were certified for the 2023 edition.
- **Sewing**: 11 girls were certified in clothing production techniques.





3. Financial Inclusion of Women

Six groups comprising **121** women and **63** men, with group capital ranging from 261.45 USD to 1,179.5 USD for the year 2023.

The members are organized into 103 individual Income Generating Activities (IGAs) and 5 collective IGAs. Out of 121, the monthly income of an individual IGA is estimated at 24.5 USD/month. The percentage of income for collective IGAs varies between 189.3% and 495.23%.

Good health and well-being are fundamental pillars of resilient communities, and we contribute to promoting preventive healthcare services to mitigate the challenges faced by marginalized communities.

1. Holistic Alternative Care

804 youths (416 boys + 388 girls) reached through our approaches contributing to improving access to information, health, and overall well-being.



- **477** children provided with psychosocial support, with 53% thriving and reintegrated into social, familial, and school environments.
- **65** children with disabilities (35 boys and 30 girls) (blind and visually impaired) express their traumas and integrate into the community.
- 262 youths educated on Adolescent and Youth Health and Wellbeing (ESBEAJ).
- 52% decrease in absenteeism rate.


2. Access to Services


345 women referred to healthcare services for free consultations on Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) and medications.

Objective 4

Strengthening Communication and Visibility for Advocacy towards Marginalized Communities

Our actions and interventions in the community have been disseminated across our digital platforms, including Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, LinkedIn, and YouTube. In 2023, we published over 2,190 posts on our platforms, mobilizing \$10,000 for marginalized communities. Additionally, we produced and distributed 12 newsletters to our partners annually.








FINANCES 2023

In 2023, our revenue surged by 21,45% compared to 2022, reaching \$300,295 USD. This remarkable growth was fueled by the collective efforts of our dedicated partners, both longstanding and newly engaged. Together, we tackled unprecedented challenges and seized opportunities, from providing steadfast support to vulnerable communities, particularly women and children, to empowering over 700 students in schools. This revenue boost directly translated into expanded benefits for our beneficiaries and enhanced capacity within our team.
